Funding Opportunity At-A-Glance

Available Funding	Up to twenty (20) awards of up to \$25,000 per year for two years. Maximum of up to \$50,000 per organization.
Grant Start Date	September 1, 2025
Eligible Applicants	Massachusetts based non-profit 501(c)3 organizations or groups with a 501(c)3 fiscal sponsor are eligible to apply.
Eligible Activities	Activities that aim to increase the capacity for community-based organizations and service providers to promote and provide problem gambling treatment services in Massachusetts.
Application Deadline	Monday, June 2, 2025, at 11:59 PM EST
Funding Notifications	August 1, 2025




Quick Tips

What makes a strong application?





Purpose of Funding

- Expand capacity to promote and provide outpatient problem gambling treatment services.
- Build workforce capacity to serve identified target populations.
- Prioritize organizations serving **populations at higher risk** for problem gambling.
- Integrate racial equity, lived experience, and culturally responsive strategies.



Overview of Narrative Questions

Organization Overview (5pts)	Provide a brief summary of your organization's mission, services, and the community you serve.
Capacity Building Needs (20pts)	Explain how this funding will help grow your ability to provide problem gambling treatment, including current efforts, challenges, and how the grant will address them.
Approach (20pts)	Describe your overall strategy for tackling problem gambling, especially how you integrate lived experience, racial equity, and cultural responsiveness.
Proven Commitment to Target Populations (20pts)	Highlight your track record of engaging and serving the target population, including the methods and relationships you've built.
Innovation (15pts)	Outline creative or non-traditional approaches your organization is using or planning to use to expand access to problem gambling services.
Feasibility (20pts)	Outline a well-structured work plan and budget that align with the goals of this funding opportunity.



Continuum of Behavioral Health and Addiction

Prevention

 Screening and outreach programs that screen for addictive behaviors.

Treatment

 Clinical and other types of approaches to treat addictive behaviors.

Recovery

 Programs to support recovery for addictive behaviors/addiction, including peersupported and peerled recovery.

Referrals and Workforce Capacity-Building Partner

Existing Problem Gambling Treatment Providers

- Community-based organizations and service providers already offering problem gambling treatment to target populations.
- Including MDPH Bureau of Substance Addiction Services (BSAS)
 outpatient substance use treatment programs.
- Must successfully demonstrate how they will expand their capacity to strengthen workforce development and enhance treatment services within the grant period.



Existing Problem Gambling Treatment Providers

Some examples of workforce development and other activities eligible for funding

- Certifications, training, and continued learning opportunities
- Salary support for clinicians who are providing problem gambling treatment services
- Stipends for staff, consultants, and individuals with lived experience to build knowledge and skills, support outreach, and deliver services for problem gambling
- Material development, website enhancements, or other outreach efforts
- Collaboration with local small businesses to identify job opportunities and connect individuals to employment
- Developing and implementing evaluation tools
- Reimbursement



Existing Problem Gambling Treatment Providers

NARRATIVE

- Highlight your track record and outcomes in providing treatment services.
- Emphasize how additional funding will expand or enhance what you're already doing.

WORKPLAN

- Clearly outline specific steps to scale or strengthen current services
- Show how efforts align with existing programming for seamless integration.

BUDGET

 Allocate resources to training or infrastructure that will improve service delivery and access.



New Providers Committed to Treatment Services

- Community-based organizations and service providers that serve target populations and plan to begin offering outpatient treatment services by the end of the grant period.
- Must successfully outline a clear roadmap for building workforce capacity and establishing treatment services within the grant period.



New Providers Committed to Treatment Services

Some examples of workforce development and other activities eligible for funding

- Hosting listening sessions, focus groups, or community events to better understand community needs and tailor services accordingly.
- Developing policies, protocols, and workflows to integrate problem gambling treatment into existing services.
- Establishing referral networks with other providers, such as mental health, substance use, and primary care organizations, to ensure a continuum of care.
- Partnering with experienced providers for guidance and support in implementing effective problem gambling treatment programs.



New Providers Committed to Treatment Services

NARRATIVE

- Lay out a strong, achievable roadmap for building treatment capacity within the grant period.
- Describe early efforts in prevention and how they support preparedness and a foundation for treatment services.

WORKPLAN

- Detail the steps from current prevention work to establishing treatment services
- Build in technical assistance and data collection.

BUDGET

- Prioritize infrastructure and training costs
- Ensure funds align with building a sustainable treatment infrastructure.



Referrals and Workforce Capacity-Building Partner

- Community-based organizations that do not currently provide treatment services but have an established or will be establishing a partnership with a therapeutic or clinical treatment provider.
- Must use grant funding to build organizational capacity and workforce of Outreach Coordinators & Ambassadors (or a similar position) to expand outreach and increase referrals to their treatment partner.
- A completed partnership letter from the treatment provider must be submitted as part of the application to ensure a coordinated, joint approach under a single applicant.



Referrals and Workforce Capacity-Building Partner

Some examples of workforce development and other activities eligible for funding

- Strengthen internal systems to identify, screen, and refer individuals to treatment.
- Host outreach and education events to raise awareness about problem gambling and promote treatment services offered by partner organization.
- Collaborate with treatment partners to co-design referral processes, coordinate care, and share data.
- Hold regular check-ins with partners to track referrals, address challenges, and improve coordination.



Referrals and Workforce Capacity-Building Partner

NARRATIVE

- Emphasize your prevention efforts and relationships with target populations.
- Highlight how outreach and referrals will close access gaps.

WORKPLAN

- Outline how you will train and support outreach.
- Include shared activities with your treatment partner
- Show alignment
 with your partner's
 treatment
 workflows to
 ensure continuity of
 care.

BUDGET

- Include stipends, travel, or incentives that increase accessibility for target populations.
- Coordinate with your partner's services to avoid duplication and maximize impact.

PARTNERSHIP LETTER

- Describe the strength of your partnership
- Clarify roles and responsibilities



Reminders

- Review, review, review!
- Have someone else review the narrative with "fresh eyes," including internal and external colleagues.
- Ensure that you followed the word count, font size and other required formats.
- Conduct a final checklist review on templates, attachments, etc.
- Don't wait until the last minute.
